


St. Michael the Archangel,

History of the Crosses at Crossroads and the Polish Settlement Area – The Polish Kashub immigrants to the area brought with them a culture rich in religious tradition. Due to set backs such as distance from the nearest churches, adverse weather conditions and poor road systems, many Polish Kashub settlers were unable to attend church on a regular basis without great hardship. They erected crosses at main road intersections and would gather there to pray and celebrate the Holy Days. These crosses were also used as a place to stop and thank the Lord on their journey to town. Six of the original crosses erected by Polish Kashub settlers are still standing. Currently, more than 28 crosses can be seen at local intersections. Perhaps when we pass by, say a little prayer for your Parish Family

Apostle of the Eucharist

St. Eymard encouraged perpetual adoration as a response of love and frequent Communion as a source of strength for the Christian life. Throughout his life, he was fascinated by the Presence of Christ in the Holy Eucharist, which became the all-consuming focus of his life. He said: "*The greatest grace of my life has been a lively faith in the Blessed Sacrament since my childhood. The Holy Eucharist is Jesus, past, present and future.*" He felt that the spiritual malaise of his times could only be changed by the fire of Eucharistic love. Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament became the sign of that love.
