THE LATERAN BASILICA: Whenever the ninth of November falls on a Sunday, many churchgoers are surprised to learn that the regular Mass has been replaced by one for the Feast of the Dedication of St. John Lateran. Christmas, Easter, even All Souls Day we understand. But John Lateran? Early in the fourth century the persecution of Christians came to a close with the conversion of the emperor Constantine, who granted the followers of Jesus the right to public worship. Constantine offered Pope Sylvester I some property owned by the Lateran family, which became the site of the first Christian Basilica, dedicated on November 9, 324. In time, the church was placed under the patronage of St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist. The popes lived in a palace adjoining the church which underwent several renovations over the centuries. Even though the popes moved to Avignon, France for a century and eventually to a residence in the Vatican palace, the Lateran Basilica remains the cathedral church of Rome. When we speak of the pope as bishop of Rome, this is his cathedral, not St. Peter's. Since the pope is the shepherd of the universal church, the Lateran Basilica of St. John is the cathedral church of the world. Each year the dedication of this building is celebrated in every Catholic parish in the world on November 9. It proclaims the original freedom of Christians to worship, the dedication of our ancestors to worship, the perseverance of our faith and the universal nature of our community. THE CHURCH – EVER ANCIENT, EVER NEW, EVER BEAUTIFUL: The Lateran embodies the paradox of the Church: ever ancient in her apostolic foundation, ever new in her Spirit-led renewal, ever beautiful in her sacramental life and eschatological hope. She is the universal sacrament of salvation (*Lumen Gentium* 48), the communion of saints across heaven, earth, and purgatory (*LG* 49–51), and the Bride adorned for her Bridegroom — radiant with holiness, configured to Christ, and ordered toward glory.

Being so close to our mother the church, we tend to forget this. We only see the wrinkles and the blemishes. Being in the family we know the dark secrets, the bickering, the harsh words, the hasty actions, the worldly entanglements, the sinful compromises and betrayals. So once and a while we need to step back and look at her from the perspective of history, to compare her with the greatest human achievements and admit that there is no more beautiful, noble, responsible, grace-filled collection of people in the history of humanity. But the church's horizon transcends mere humanity. She proceeds from grace to grace as the Body and Bride of Christ. She is enlightened and transformed in her belief in the Incarnation, in the dignity of humanity, in the Pasch of her Savior, and in the victory of Divine Mercy. We need not be ashamed that her holiness is always embodied in her members whose humanity is both beautiful and sinful. In her saints – and that is all of us - she gives witness to the peace of the Kingdom, to a freedom in Christ to love others, and to the joy of being loved by the Father.

ST. ANDREW'S TURKEY BINGO: Thursday, November 27 in Killaloe at 7:00 p.m.

THE ARCHBASILICA OF ST. JOHN LATERAN: stands not merely as a historic monument, but as a living sign of the Church's visible unity and spiritual maternity. As the cathedral of the Bishop of Rome — the Pope — it holds primacy among all churches, not by human designation alone, but by divine providence and ecclesial constitution.

Above its entrance is inscribed the declaration: "Mother and head of all the churches of the city and of the world." Liturgically and historically, the Lateran is dedicated primarily to Christ the Savior, with secondary dedications to St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist. Its façade bears the inscription: "Christo Salvatori"—"To Christ the Savior". This affirms that all ecclesial authority—including that of the Roman Pontiff—flows not from human power but from Christ himself, the Head of the Body, the source of grace, and the Lord of history. To behold the Lateran is to behold the mystery of the Church herself: maternal, militant, and majestic—a dwelling place of God among humanity, and a foretaste of the heavenly Jerusalem.
